School Committee Update – March, 2010

On Feb. 11th, a joint meeting of the School Committee, Boards of Selectmen and Finance from Blackstone and Millville, as well as Senator Moore was held at the Millville Town Hall. Minimum contribution is expected to increase for both towns, Millville's by an additional \$60,000 and Blackstone's by \$110,000. Both the Senator and Representative urged caution when developing the budgets for the next two years. The governor's budget for FY11 uses federal stimulus money, which has not yet been appropriated and no stimulus money is expected to be available for FY12.

We are making great strides in keeping our budget transparent. The Open Hearing meeting for the District's FY11 budget will be held on Thurs., March 11th at 7PM in the Molony-Sullivan Auditorium at the High School. We urge you to attend. The Superintendent will present a level services budget.

The Superintendent has worked to save money wherever possible. One way was to utilize the resources of other towns by job sharing with Bellingham in two key positions: the Directors of Food Service and Curriculum. Another idea being explored was the possibility of moving the 5th grade to the middle school. After initial investigation, there would be NO educational enhancement or savings, so the idea has been dropped. The 5th graders will remain housed at the A. F. Maloney and Millville Elementary Schools.

NOTES FROM THE NURSE

Sports Physicals

Any student trying out for a spring sport must have had a physical by a physician within 13 months prior to the first day of tryouts. I need to have a copy of the physical exam in order to sign the athletic eligibility form. Students are not allowed to tryout for a sport if the eligibility form is not signed. Dr. Perriello, the school physician, will be here on Wednesday, March 3, to do sports physicals for those students who need one in order to tryout for a spring sport. Please have your son or daughter come see me if they need to have a physical.

Postural Screening

Postural Screenings will be conducted to detect spinal problems in children of grades 6, 7 and 8 on April 8 and 9. This screening is mandatory under Massachusetts State Law; Chapter 71; Section 57. All students are expected to participate in this screening program. Only a doctor's note stating the child has been screened in the past year will excuse a child from the school screening.

The purpose of the screening is to find early signs of possible spinal problems. It is not a diagnostic

service, but a program to identify young people who should have further medical evaluation. If your child has any unusual findings, you will be notified and asked to take your child to your family physician or pediatrician for further evaluation. The majority of the students exhibit no findings. If nothing unusual is found, I will not be contacting you again until the screening process next year.

The procedure for screening is a simple one in which the physical education instructor (for boys) or school nurse (for girls) looks at the child's back as he/she stands upright and bends forward. Boys will be asked to remove their shirts and girls will be asked to pull their shirt up around the neck line in order to visualize the spine.

What can I do to keep my child from getting sick?

It is important to teach your children how to reduce their risk of getting the flu and how to protect others from becoming infected. *If we all practice good hygiene, we can limit the spread of flu in our schools.*

- **Get your child both the H1N1 and seasonal flu shots.** Vaccination is the best way to keep your child from getting the flu.
- **Teach your children to wash their hands often.** Washing with soap and hot water for at least 20 seconds is ideal (about as long as it takes to sing the "Happy Birthday" song twice).
- **Teach your children to use hand sanitizer.** Gels, rubs, and hand wipes all work well, as long as they contain at least 60% alcohol. Watch small children using gels so they don't swallow it.
- **Teach your children to cough or sneeze into their elbow—not their hands!** Cover coughs and sneezes with tissues or by coughing into the inside of their elbow. They should wash their hands after blowing their nose or coughing into a tissue.
- **Teach your children to avoid touching their nose, mouth or eyes.** They should keep their hands away from their face.

**** Flu spreads easily from person to person. If you think your child is getting the flu please keep them home. When you call to report your child absent due to illness, please leave a detailed message as to which of the following symptoms your child has: fever, sore throat, cough, runny nose, headache, vomiting, diarrhea, or feeling very tired. All students with a fever or vomiting should stay home for at least 24 hours without fever or vomiting. If you have any questions please call me at 508-876-0193, option 3.

Notes from the Teams...

...6th Grade...

Science - Ms. DuRocher and Mrs. Laren

The sixth graders are continuing to study plate boundaries with more focus on the 3 main types of mountains: dome, fault-block and folded. Students are working in groups and creating a poster of information about what they have read in the Dynamic Earth book about the different types of mountains and how they are formed. Each group will present their poster and information to the class. Students will also research the highest mountain on each continent and create a bar graph with the heights of each mountain. We will then move on to Earthquakes and Tsunamis.

As a reminder, highlighters, pencils and erasers, colored pencils, and loose leaf (3-hole binder) paper are some of the supplies that we use on a fairly regular basis. It would be helpful for your child to have his/her own supply replenished.

ELA - Mrs. Adamz and Mrs. Lawson

ELA classes will be reading selections from various genres, practicing test taking skills including answering multiple choice questions, reasoning through answer choices, and finding evidence in the text to support their answer choices as well as open responses. Please continue to encourage your child's timely completion of reading comprehension (practice MCAS test) packets.

Open responses will be the writing focus through March. Students need to mark key words in and label the multiple parts of (parts a, b, c, etc.) all open response prompts. Pre-writing strategies (lists, templates, charts, outlines, diagrams), on-topic explanations with relevant, supporting details, rough drafts, proper topic sentences and clinchers, and proper paragraph organization are all required practice of thoughtful open response writing.

This quarter, students are also reviewing the parts of a sentence and types of sentences. Too many sentences written by students are incomplete, choppy, or not punctuated. Knowing proper sentence structure will

help students correctly form and use various kinds of sentences so their writing is smooth and logical.

QUARTER 3 TEST: A quarterly test will be given at the end of March. A test study guide worksheet will be given to students about one week in advance. This is homework and will be reviewed in class.

Math - Mrs. Dansereau and Mrs. Boisvert

We recently finished our algebra unit with coordinate graphing and functions. Students have a better understanding that functions can be represented three ways; as a rule, a table or a graph, and students are comfortable moving between the three representations. We also began our rather large unit on geometry and measurement. Since geometry is unique, it is filled with a variety of new vocabulary terms which we only see when working with geometric figures. As a result, students will be required to study their vocabulary terms for homework so that they can read and interpret directions and problems within our geometry unit and on into MCAS in May. Along with the month of March, we will be assigning our third quarter project which will count as a test grade. More information will be provided at the beginning of March.

Social Studies - Mrs. Daignault and Mr. McCourt

Students in Mrs. Daignault's & Mr. McCourt's Social Studies classes are currently studying the region of Southwest Asia. The first task was for students to get to know the 15 countries that make up this exciting region. Next students got to know what life was like on the Arabian Peninsula (Life in the Desert). Following desert life we discussed O.P.E.C. (what it is, who it is, and what their job is). Students are currently exploring the 3 major world religions that originated in the Middle East. Students are exploring some of the similarities and differences between Judaism, Christianity, and Islam and also how these three religions shape the way people live in this unique region of Asia. After this region students will next study North/Central Asia, then East Asia, and finish with Southeast Asia.

...7th Grade...

Ancient Civilizations with Mrs. Hardy, Mrs. Finnegan, Mrs. Carroll, Mrs. Turgeon, Mrs. Abisla and Mrs. Kozlowski

Grade 7 students had quite an exciting time continuing their study of Ancient Egypt with a trip to the Boston Museum of Fine Arts-Egypt Exhibit. The students were able to witness, first hand, some of the fascinating artifacts of this amazing time period, as well as to visit the Tomb 10A-complete with a mummy's head and all!! They gained knowledge of this topic through the study of myths, student created power point presentations and various class activities. They will be wrapping up this unit and moving on to study the Phoenicians and Hebrews and the impact these two cultures had on one another. It should be another exciting time period to unfold and learn about!!!

Life Science with Mrs. Hardy and Mrs. Abisla

Having finished studying the building blocks and blueprints of life (the cell and its DNA), we are now equipped to roam the various kingdoms of living things. Along the way we will stop at various sign posts to meet many examples of the flora and fauna found in nature- from itty bitty bacteria to the largest organisms resting under the giant sequoias.

English/Language Arts with Mrs. Carroll, Mrs. Turgeon and Ms. Kozlowski

During this month students will focus on the five-paragraph essay in preparation for MCAS testing, which begins on March 23. In addition, work will be done on the concept of "foreshadowing" in literature. The quiz on the third quarter independent reading book is scheduled for Tuesday, March 9, so students should be well into their novels by the beginning of the month.

Pre-Algebra with Mrs. Rose, Mrs. Finnegan, and Mrs. Swanson

Students finished the month of February working with ratios, proportions, unit rates, unit pricing (hopefully they can help you find the better deals at the store now!), and applying ratios to determine if figures were similar.

The month of March will be spent on Geometry. Be sure to ask your child this riddle: "What did the little acorn say when he grew up?" Students will also explore Pi (3.14) on March 15th this year because the 14th falls on a Sunday (3/14). During their classes, students will "discover" Pi by measuring objects to see the ratio between the diameter and the circumference. Students will read about the history of Pi and listen to Pi songs as well. Lastly, students will be eating real pie at the end of class. We are looking forward to this exciting day. Please encourage your child to keep up with homework assignments and to stay after school for extra help when necessary.

...8th Grade...

World History

In World History, we will be exploring the Far East during medieval times. We will be looking at the Tang and Song dynasties of China along with the Mongol invasions led by Genghis Khan and Kublai Khan. In medieval Japan, we will learn about the samurai and their code of bushido. In India, we will explore the great Mughal Empire, muslim influence, and the Taj Mahal.

Physical Science

Mrs. McLean and Ms. Solari's Physical Science classes have completed a unit on the classes of matter – elements, compounds and mixtures. They are going to use what they have learned about solutions and experimental design to plan and conduct an experiment on factors that can change the rate of dissolving. After conducting their well-designed experiments, the students will evaluate their results and publish a report of their conclusions.

The next unit of study will dive into the structure of the atom and a fun study of the elements and periodic table. We will make models of atoms out of fruit loops and uncover the patterns on the periodic table.

English

With our study of *The Diary of Anne Frank* behind us, we are looking forward to our next units

of study which will include poetry, figurative language, non-fiction, and expository writing. We will continue to build on these topics from previous years as well as to prepare for the upcoming ELA MCAS testing. In addition, we will continue our study of grammar focusing on clauses and kinds of sentences.

We are proud of our students' accomplishments thus far and remind them to keep up the good work and remain diligent in their work and studies!

Grade 8 Math

In Extended Algebra, our first half study of algebra will now be applied to new contexts. The study of shapes, angles, and lines will now use the skills that have been learned throughout the year. The Pythagorean Theorem will be discussed in addition to analyzing characteristics of polygons and multi dimensional figures

In Algebra 1, we will continue our study of polynomials. We are beginning to establish the foundation for what will be used in Algebra 2. Factoring, solving, and graphing will be the major focus of the third quarter. The use of graphing calculators will continue in order to provide the students a technological perspective of what we are studying.

Student Council News

Student council has been working hard over the past month to implement some of our annual traditions during this time of year. The week prior to February break we were able to assist Mrs. Abrams in putting together our second annual Singing Telegrams. StuCo members sold the telegrams at lunches for \$2.00 and the Singing Telegrams were "delivered" on the Friday before vacation! Over \$200 was raised to be donated to the Red Cross/Haiti Relief

fund. Also the week prior to vacation we had spirit days each of the days, such as "Fashion Disaster Day", "Multiplicity Day", and "Hartnett Pride Day". It is always nice to see the school community come together and participate in this way.

In the works for March in conjunction with Mrs. Amanda Smutok and NJHS, is a month long "Pay-it Forward" theme, where each of the weeks will have its own theme of

Paying it Forward. A few examples of the themed weeks are: "Donation Week" where we will be collecting items for Project Smile (stuffed animals, coloring books, crayons, etc), and "Thank You Week" where students/staff may take some time to write a Thank You note to some one in the community (Fire, Police, town officials, etc).
